1 MR. GUSEL: Good evening. The Downers Grove
2 Park District March 17th meeting is now called to
3 order. Roll call, please?

4 MS. RANK: Miss Barr?

1 the bills; payout number four for Camosy Construction
2 in regard to Fishel Park band shell; and payout number
3 ten to Ehlike Lonigro for the Fishel Park band shell
4 design; as well as the release of lease interest for
5 Verizon Wireless for Whitlock Park. I would like to
6 back up and note the payment of the bills is in the
7 amount of \$740,914.93.

8 MR. GUSEL: Do I have a motion?

9 MS. MAHONEY: I move to accept the consent agenda
10 including the payment of the bills for \$740,914.93.

11 MR. CUSHING: Second.

12 MR. GUSEL: Any discussion? Roll call, please?

13 MS. RANK: Miss Mahoney?

14 MS. MAHONEY: Aye.

15 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

16 MR. CUSHING: Aye.

17 MS. RANK: Miss Barr?

20 MR. GUSEL: Aye. Then moving on to the active
21 agenda.

22 MR. CERMAK: Thank you very much. The only

1 item on the active agenda this evening is a recommen-
2 dation for the construction management for McCollum
3 Park renovation. And Director Reese will review
4 that recommendation for you.

5 MR. REESE: Thank you, Dan. Good evening,
6 Commissioners. You have in your packet our March 9th,
7 2011 memo regarding McCollum Park construction
8 management services. As you know on February 3rd,
9 2011 the park board authorized staff to seek proposals
10 for construction management services associated with
11 the McCollum Park infrastructure renovation project.
12 As previously discussed, staff and the attorney
13 believe that the CM approach or delivery method
14 provides an opportunity for better control of the
15 project schedule, the quality of construction, control
16 of site logistics, and as previously discussed the
17 logistics or how we play through construction is an
18 important component.

19 Staff prepared and delivered a request for
20 qualifications to ten qualified firms who expressed
21 an interest in the project, and we received nine
22 statement of qualification responses. Following the

1 review and evaluation of the qualifications staff
2 selected four firms as finalists which we interviewed
3 on March 7th. Staff conducted the interviews and
4 provided a 15- to 20-minute presentation opportunity
5 for firms. We followed up with questions from the
6 park district staff. And following the interview
7 process staff ranked or evaluated and ranked the four
8 firms based on their initial RFQ responses and their
9 non fee RFP responses, their interview performance,
10 overall experience level. Both municipal and park
11 district experience were evaluated and the qualifi-
12 cations of the individual team members as well as
13 the firm as a whole.

14 The resulting staff rankings for the four
15 firms were as follows: Number one, Corporate
16 Construction Services; number two, Camosy
17 Construction; number three, Frederick Quinn
18 Corporation; and number four, V3 Construction Group.

19 In terms of Corporate Construction's
20 background they have a proven track record of project
21 delivery both on time and on budget. Additionally
22 Corporate Construction has a significant level of

1 experience with park district projects. During the
2 last five years 80% of their work is with park and
3 recreation agencies. And staff's opinion was that
4 they're a capable firm, they have an adequate level
5 of experience and abilities, and fee aside we felt
6 they were the best fit for the McCollum Park project.

7 Once we completed our non fee rankings we
8 did open up the sealed fee envelopes. And we have --
9 In our memo you can see the recap, the fee proposals
10 submitted by all four firms which were anywhere from
11 \$293,000 by Corporate Construction and the high group
12 was V3 Construction Group at about \$361,000.

13 In summary, having examined the benefits
14 of using a construction manager as advisor for the
15 delivery method, staff has concluded that it's in
16 the best interests of the district to -- I'm sorry --
17 staff has concluded that it's the best delivery method
18 for the McCollum Park infrastructure renovation
19 improvements. And after considering all nine firms
20 staff believes Corporate Construction is the best
21 suited for the assignment based on their credentials,
22 their experience and lastly on their fee.

1 In addition, the fee outline represents
2 about 8% of the \$3.5 million construction value. And
3 by comparison to general contracting which we
4 reviewed with you, I think, back in January, we
5 think that's a savings or could be a savings of
6 anywhere from \$30,000 to \$60,000 but in addition
7 carries the benefits of control of schedule and
8 quality and logistics.

9 With that staff's recommendation is that
10 the park board award a contract for construction
11 manager as advisor for McCollum Park infrastructure
12 renovation improvements and we award it to Corporate
13 Construction Services in the amount of \$288,256 as
14 outlined which includes a \$5,000 reduction of fee
15 which was negotiated. With that staff would be happy
16 to answer any questions you have.

17 MR. GUSEL: Anybody have any questions?

18 MR. CUSHING: I don't have a question. Just I
19 go back to our discussion before. I mean I hope we
20 can realize the thirty to \$60,000 savings. I am not
21 a hundred percent that we will realize that. But
22 definitely especially on this project where we're

1 keeping so much of the park on line and doing -- and
2 saving it and trying to keep fields active, I think
3 having a site superintendent out there on a daily
4 basis is not the sole reason but I think that's a
5 very strong reason to go with the construction
6 management.

7 MR. CERMAK: The problem to your comment on the
8 savings, typically where you have a general con-
9 tractor's bid you would never be able to see what
10 he's charging to coordinate the service whether it's
11 8% or 10% or 12%. You just don't see it because
12 it's buried in that lump sum.

13 MR. CUSHING: Right.

14 MR. CERMAK: So this process is actually very
15 similar except we extract the percentage that the
16 general contractor would normally charge to do these
17 services and you pay the construction manager instead
18 of the general. But you can never find what he
19 actually charges us because it's always buried in
20 the lump sum contract.

21 MR. CUSHING: It would be hard ever to probably
22 quantify the savings unless you had two identical

1 projects to compare it to. But like I said, I think
2 having somebody on site, that's a pretty strong, strong
3 reason.

4 MR. REESE: And if we could clarify too, it is
5 not one person that we are getting. The CM firm is
6 going to provide four to five people similar in some
7 ways to how a GC would handle it. So you have got a
8 full-time site superintendent, you have got a project
9 manager, you have got people with expertise in cost
10 estimating, you have got submittal expeditors and
11 office support people as well. So it's really a team
12 of four or five individuals that will be working for
13 the park district.

14 MR. CUSHING: Sure.

15 MR. CERMAK: Yeah. We actually had a comment
16 from one commissioner that they thought maybe one
17 person could do this job. In all practicality it is
18 not a one-man job. And the request for qualifications,
19 I don't know, did you forward that to the board?

20 MR. REESE: We did not forward it. I think we
21 sent it along to one of the commissioners as
22 requested.

1 MR. CERMAK: Okay. There's a plethora of things
2 that are involved in this. It's more than just one
3 guy on the site has to take care of. There's a whole
4 project management team back at the office coordinating
5 shop drawings and contracts and change orders and
6 daily schedules.

7 MR. REESE: Pay requests, safety coordination
8 on the site. There's a lot to it.

9 MR. CERMAK: It's a huge -- This is a big job.

10 MR. CUSHING: Right. Well, like I said, trying
11 to keep the park working, you know, around it, I
12 think that's -- that gets my support for this plan.

13 MR. CERMAK: That's going to be a challenge too,
14 but I think that we can do it.

15 MS. BARR: Some contracts I know for contractors
16 we put incentives for meeting deadlines or maybe
17 disincentives for not meeting deadlines or being
18 safe or saving money or whatever the incentives are.
19 Is there anything like that built into these
20 contracts?

21 MR. REESE: Well, that is one thing that's a
22 little different about this. This is a contract for

1 construction management services, so they're profes-
2 sional services. They will work for us. And there's
3 not an incentive for them to finish early other than
4 their reputation, and certainly in terms of being
5 late there is no penalty. It is not liquidated
6 damages like you would see on a general contractor.
7 However, they will be writing into the specifications
8 for all of the -- we call them prime contractors or
9 subcontractors there will be liquidated damages and
10 schedule expectations on them. So all the people
11 performing the actual bricks and mortar work, there
12 is not an incentive but there is a penalty if they
13 don't deliver on schedule.

14 MR. GUSEL: And they will hold them accountable --

15 MR. REESE: That's right.

16 MR. GUSEL: -- for us.

17 MR. REESE: On our behalf. That's right.

18 MR. CUSHING: If they go long their fee doesn't
19 change. So basically their hourly would be going
20 down.

21 MR. REESE: If they go long -- We have a
22 15-month contract that would start effective next

1 week or tomorrow actually, and it goes to June 1.
 2 If it should go much longer than a week or two they'd
 3 like to have a discussion with us about that if
 4 there were things out of their control that caused
 5 the project to go long. We don't reward them if
 6 they finish early. That's not what we're paying
 7 them to do. We're paying them to deliver as quickly
 8 as possible but no later than.

9 MR. CUSHING: Sure.

10 MR. REESE: And I think too, Dan, one more
 11 thing we did want to mention too. I think with
 12 respect to budget we are having some budget pressures
 13 now. And so the CM will come in immediately and
 14 start to really work hard with our design consultants
 15 and the park district team to get the budget dialed
 16 back down to where we need it to be. And also on a
 17 related matter because of that we wanted you to know
 18 that the board had previously authorized \$20,000 to
 19 design water play features as an alternate bid item,
 20 but we thought at this time we would hold off on
 21 that until we know we can get things back down to
 22 the budget where it needs to be.

1 MR. CERMAK: So what Todd is saying is once we
 2 take bids and we see that perhaps we do have the
 3 money to do water play, we'll go out and get the
 4 design, rebid that and add it to this contract as
 5 long as we're within budget. But at this point we
 6 don't want to spend the \$20,000 if we maybe are over
 7 budget anyway. However, the base construction will
 8 include the systems run to the water play conceptual
 9 site so one day when we do have the money if we
 10 don't have it on this job we can just come in and
 11 hook it up.

12 MR. REESE: Exactly.

13 MR. CERMAK: Is that fair?

14 MR. REESE: Yes.

15 MR. GUSEL: Any other comments? Can I get a
 16 motion, please?

17 MS. BARR: I will move that we accept staff's
 18 recommendation that the park board award a contract
 19 for construction manager as advisor for the McCollum
 20 Park infrastructure renovation project to Corporate
 21 Construction Services in the amount of \$288,256 as
 22 outlined above.

1 MR. CUSHING: Second.

2 MR. GUSEL: Any other discussion? Roll call,
 3 please?

4 MS. RANK: Miss Barr?

5 MS. BARR: Aye.

6 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

7 MR. CUSHING: Aye.

8 MS. RANK: Mr. Gusel?

9 MR. GUSEL: Aye.

10 MS. RANK: Miss Mahoney?

11 MS. MAHONEY: Aye.

12 MR. CERMAK: Thank you, Todd.

13 MR. REESE: Thank you.

14 MR. CERMAK: You can stay right there. I would
 15 just like to say one other thing on this project. Be
 16 ready for multiple payouts every month, maybe ten to
 17 15. We are not sure exactly how many trades will be
 18 on this job, but once we hit the ground running since
 19 we will hold all of the contracts we won't pay a
 20 general contractor one amount; we are going to pay
 21 ten or 15 trades every month throughout the duration
 22 of this project. So you are going to see that consent

1 agenda really step up. I just wanted to let you
 2 know it's going to be a little more active on the
 3 top half of the agenda. Thank you.

4 Next we have the Parks reports, and we'll
 5 continue with Director Reese.

6 MR. REESE: Thanks, Dan. We will keep it brief
 7 tonight.

8 Patriots Park Barth Pond shoreline improve-
 9 ments. We have had a little break because of the
 10 weather, but if you have been by recently you will
 11 see that the stone edge has been progressing around --
 12 We have completed the south. We reported that
 13 previously. We're past the weir. Well, actually we
 14 went south down up above the weirs, back down the
 15 west side under the playground and are about to the
 16 boat launch area. We're probably a good two-thirds
 17 of the way around the lake. The water level was up
 18 high for a couple weeks. That's why we didn't see
 19 any activity there. They should be out next week to
 20 continue.

21 Fishel Park band shell improvements are
 22 progressing well. If you have been by the site this

1 week we had some nice weather and a lot of activities,
 2 a crane and a couple of lifts on the site, and they
 3 have been busy placing steel all week. So you will
 4 see the roof structure pretty much in place. I went
 5 by tonight and they had two solid days and lifted
 6 the main beam in yesterday. Dan was there. One of
 7 the commissioners stopped by as well. And it was
 8 very exciting because now you see the two halves get
 9 tied together with the roof structure, and you can
 10 actually see the form of the building and the scale.
 11 And staff is very pleased with how it fits on the
 12 site.

13 Next week the stone will be delivered to
 14 the site. That will be the limestone veneer material.
 15 And they will do a mock-up section of wall for us
 16 early next week, weather permitting, and then the
 17 masons will get busy as long as the weather is good.
 18 They will start putting up the lime veneer all around.
 19 The roof deck will go on the main roof and the
 20 finished roof will go on after that. And right now
 21 it looks like we're still good for June 15th, so
 22 we're excited about that.

1 On the IGA projects at Washington Park and
 2 McCollum Park we wanted to report to you that we have
 3 to send some communications to the village staff
 4 regarding the completion of outstanding punch list
 5 items. The last we had heard from them was about
 6 January with an updated list but not a specific
 7 schedule. And so the park district was interested
 8 in making sure that there was a good plan in place
 9 or a good strategy for getting the work done by May
 10 1st -- I believe, Dan, is what we requested -- and
 11 that if there isn't good progress that they have a
 12 contingency plan in place to make it happen. So
 13 that's where we are with that.

14 On the park maintenance operation side --
 15 MR. CUSHING: I do have a couple questions. We
 16 were out at Washington Park last week. I did notice --
 17 Well, it wasn't organized but there was a lot of
 18 activity on the upper field. I don't know if we're
 19 trying to keep people off there to let the grass
 20 grow or not. I know that's going to be hard to do,
 21 but I sat there cringing watching seeing people run
 22 all over.

1 MR. REESE: On the north lobe?

2 MR. CUSHING: Uh-huh.

3 MR. REESE: Paul and I were by there as well
 4 and we saw some of that activity too. It was a nice
 5 spring day, teenage kids.

6 MR. CUSHING: Right. I know it's going to be
 7 hard to prevent.

8 MR. REESE: It's going to be tough. We know
 9 there's going to be some significant work to do. We
 10 are not too concerned at this point. We think it's
 11 pretty much going to get slit seeded in a couple
 12 directions or tilled back down to the soil and next
 13 April reseeded. It is not a concern yet.

14 MR. CUSHING: Okay. And then we also -- I
 15 think we bid it out two weeks ago or two meetings
 16 ago, the portapotties. There is no portapotty out
 17 this yet. Are they going out April -- I mean are
 18 they going out in April or --

19 MS. ARNSMAN: March 29th.

20 MR. REESE: March 29th.

21 MR. CUSHING: Do we have a location selected
 22 there? I notice there's still temporary fencing and

1 I know we had issues before with the location. We
 2 had complaints, criminal complaints regarding it.
 3 Has staff decided where we're going with it?

4 MR. REESE: I will let Dan take it.

5 MR. CERMAK: On the south lobe we are going to
 6 continue with the same location. I think I reported
 7 back to the board previously that for the time being
 8 we are not going to place a portable on the north
 9 lobe.

10 MR. CUSHING: Okay. That would be tough on
 11 kids, kids at the --

12 MR. CERMAK: Well, we beat it up and we thought
 13 that it is a little bit of a trek over to the existing
 14 location which is in the left field area of the south
 15 lobe. But after the issues we had last fall we thought
 16 it was prudent to see if we need one. We will reassess
 17 it as the summer goes by, but at this point we'd
 18 like to try it this way and see how it works out.

19 MR. CUSHING: Good.

20 MS. MAHONEY: Are we talking about the issues
 21 when the park was going to be open?

22 MR. CERMAK: Yeah, we had some issues in October

1 and November with some malicious vandalism or mischief.
 2 And we were able to stop that eventually. And after
 3 that we discussed the location. We played with several
 4 locations on that north lobe. The original location
 5 wasn't satisfactory to me, and I think we moved it
 6 over to the Prairie Avenue side at one point and moved
 7 it back to the Park side at another point. And that
 8 primarily came as we were trying to open the park up
 9 for the public. And we just have been having some
 10 problems over there. So we decided at the end of
 11 November last year not to place one there this spring.

12 MR. REESE: The department's largest area of
 13 resource allocation over the past thirty days included
 14 ice surface maintenance, snow removal, interior
 15 painting, ceiling tile replacement, tree and shrub
 16 removals, park and ice surface inspections and sign
 17 renovation work. Our focus right now is really
 18 spring clean-up. With the snow cover gone it brings
 19 with it, you know, the trash and things that we find
 20 around the fence line. So staff has been out and
 21 about in all various parks picking up litter, loose
 22 litter, branches, getting the trash picked up, cleaned

1 up, and actually we're in pretty good shape. I think
 2 we're about 90% there. So that's been our focus.
 3 Other than that we have a more detailed list in our
 4 report if you have any questions on that.

5 With regard to the golf maintenance
 6 operations staff completed the clubhouse tile floor
 7 replacement, clubhouse general repairs and maintenance,
 8 golf equipment service and repairs, in-house tree
 9 removals by the #1 green, course clean-up, fence line
 10 garbage, branch removal, stump grinding, repairs of
 11 grinding mower cutting units. And I think Sandy
 12 will report that the course opened up earlier this
 13 week and our impression was it came through the winter
 14 in very good condition. It really looks great.

15 MR. GUSEL: Just a couple other questions in
 16 regards to the IGAs. How has that impacted -- I
 17 know soccer at some point will want to use that at
 18 McCollum. DOLLS is looking to get out at Washington
 19 and they're looking at -- I know DOLLS has expressed
 20 a concern of starting a little bit later as far as
 21 games on that field. Has that issue been expressed
 22 by other user groups?

1 MR. REESE: DOLLS we have heard from. We have
 2 committed to having Washington Park, the south
 3 ballfield, ready to go in mid-May. And we have
 4 communicated that to the village as well, that that's
 5 our expectations. The north soccer field at
 6 Washington and the new field at McCollum are both
 7 new facilities, so I don't know that there is any
 8 expectation that they're needed or that they are not.
 9 Because they're new I don't think we have anything
 10 scheduled for them yet. But we anticipate both of
 11 them to be on line or ready by mid to late summer,
 12 early fall certainly.

13 MR. GUSEL: And in the fall if they use that
 14 north lobe will that be an issue for -- If there is
 15 soccer going on on that north lobe regarding back to
 16 the portapotty issue, is that something that staff
 17 is considering? Because I know those kids run up,
 18 zigzag and by the time they get down there it may be
 19 too late for 1st and 2nd graders who have to hold it
 20 to the very last minute.

21 MR. CERMAK: As I said we will be reevaluating
 22 it as the actual park gets some use. We really don't

1 have much to go by right now.

2 In regard to the fields not being open and
 3 the IGA specifically, McCollum and the softball field,
 4 yes, it has impacted our youth groups. We have heard
 5 from the DOLLS. Our own program is the one that uses
 6 the south lobe outfield for soccer in the fall. The
 7 village is late on these projects. We are about a
 8 year late on these things. We had a meeting the
 9 other day and used some strong language with the
 10 staff, I want these done by May 1st, and they have
 11 indicated that to the village. We have no leverage
 12 at this point. We are at the mercy of the contractor
 13 and the village to get this work done. But we need
 14 it done, we need it done quickly because these are
 15 public facilities and we want to get them open.

16 MR. REESE: With that we'd answer any questions
 17 you have.

18 MS. MAHONEY: I have a comment. I was talking
 19 to someone who lives around Patriots Park, and they
 20 were very excited about the work being done there.
 21 They think it looks fantastic.

22 MR. REESE: It really does. It's a good look.

1 Thank you.

2 MR. CERMAK: Thanks, Todd. Director Pfundheller,
3 the Recreation report, please.

4 MS. PFUNDHELLER: Good evening. The Recreation
5 division hosted a successful summer camp open house
6 on Monday evening at the Lincoln Center with almost
7 \$20,000 in camp registration accepted during a one-hour
8 period. Both supervisory staff and instructors were
9 on hand to promote their camps and answer questions.
10 And all in all it was much better than our first try
11 at it last year. We probably had half a dozen people
12 there last year. So our advertising worked well.

13 Tuesday marked the golf course officially
14 opening and we have been getting a lot of great
15 comments. People are saying the course is in great
16 condition. We had a really good day -- I believe it
17 was yesterday -- with 75 rounds of golf and 63 buckets
18 which is pretty good for this time of year.

19 Tuesday also marked the conclusion of the
20 annual Fitness Center membership drive. We had a
21 total of 171 memberships activated, and that yielded
22 269 new members.

1 Coming up Saturday is the second annual
2 Big Pig Championship of the World at the Recreation
3 Center starting at 12:00 noon.

4 MR. CERMAK: Thank you. What is the name of it?

5 MS. PFUNDHELLER: The Big Pig Championship of
6 the World. As you all know Matt Cushing, a former
7 Pittsburgh Steeler player, will be on site for a meet
8 and greet. He'll be giving away an autographed foot-
9 ball. And the (inaudible) mascot Wilbur and the
10 Buffalo Wild Wings mascot Mr. Buffalo will participate
11 in a friendly game of pig to kick things off. We
12 have a variety of prizes and give-aways.

13 MS. MAHONEY: What time is that?

14 MS. PFUNDHELLER: That's at noon. There are
15 prize give-aways thanks to the generous support of
16 our sponsors, Famous Dave's, Buffalo Wild Wings,
17 Dick's Sporting Goods, Play It Again Sports, Chipotle
18 Mexican Grill, Dunkin' Donuts and Honey Baked Ham
19 and Ty, Incorporated. As of this afternoon we had
20 75 players registered. Our registration is accepted
21 through today while the facilities are open and it
22 doesn't close until midnight tonight. So we have

1 one more chance tonight.

2 Included in the board information distributed
3 on Tuesday was a memo regarding the process proposed
4 for the Fishel Park band shell naming along with a
5 timeline for public input. As indicated staff intends
6 to roll out the band shell naming campaign on March
7 22nd for a three-week period. Votes can be cast
8 electronically on the website or at a facility by
9 hard copy. Name options were narrowed down to four
10 selections, plus there will be an opportunity for
11 additional write-in suggestions for the public.

12 Votes will be tabulated after voting closes on April
13 12th and presented at the April 21st board meeting
14 for review. Pending any questions that you have with
15 information in that memo, staff's looking for
16 consensus from the board to proceed with the process
17 we outlined for the Fishel Park band shell naming.

18 MS. MAHONEY: That's great. I appreciated the
19 history provided. That was very interesting. I
20 mentioned to Dan when we're getting closer to the
21 grand opening of the band shell that that information
22 might be of interest to the community.

1 MS. PFUNDHELLER: Sure.

2 MS. MAHONEY: I think that could be a way to
3 reintroduce that amenity back into the community going
4 back to the history part of it.

5 MR. CERMAK: Thanks, Sandy.

6 MS. PFUNDHELLER: Thanks.

7 MR. CERMAK: Mr. President, moving on I believe
8 we have the SEASPAR report.

9 MS. BARR: Yes. We celebrated the SEASPAR 35th
10 anniversary with a little reception. And we also
11 discussed a preliminary budget. It is very much in
12 line with the levy request that we passed earlier this
13 spring or last fall actually. And we approved the
14 bid for a bus for SEASPAR. They will have a new bus.

15 MR. GUSEL: Are they going to take one of their
16 old buses off line? Is it on a replacement schedule?

17 MS. BARR: Yes, it'll be off line. They have a
18 little bit of a play time where they will have both
19 buses, but they will switch within a few months. And
20 they are planning to sell the old bus. They won't get
21 a lot of money for it. It's like a couple thousand
22 dollars. It's got a lot of miles on it. And that's

1 all I have for you.
 2 MR. GUSEL: Anything from the plan commission?
 3 MR. CERMAK: Our plan commission representative
 4 is not here this evening.
 5 MR. GUSEL: I guess there is nothing from the
 6 plan commission.
 7 MS. BARR: I'm sorry. I did have one more thing.
 8 At SEASPAR we're having an open house this weekend.
 9 I think I gave you the --
 10 MR. CERMAK: I think the board received that
 11 previously. I believe it's March 24th --
 12 MS. BARR: Yes.
 13 MR. CERMAK: -- I think. I know the directors
 14 are planning to go. I believe it's at 5:00 o'clock
 15 on March 24th. If you are interested I will be in
 16 my office tomorrow.
 17 MS. BARR: We'd love to have people come, as
 18 many as possible. And I will not be there though.
 19 I will be out of town.
 20 MR. GUSEL: Thank you, Jan. Is there any
 21 unfinished business?
 22 MS. MAHONEY: I have an item. This goes back

1 to the issues we had in the fall at Washington Park.
 2 And we normally have an increase in problems in the
 3 parks when the weather warms up. When we have a full
 4 board I think it might be beneficial for the board
 5 to talk about what our expectations are for dealing
 6 with damages to park property. I know Janet is going
 7 to be gone and Bob's gone. So whenever that works
 8 out in the timing of meetings, I think that would be
 9 an appropriate topic.
 10 MR. GUSEL: Okay. I agree on that with Cathy.
 11 I think to give you guys direction would be helpful
 12 as a board of how we want to deal with those who --
 13 you know, if they are caught how we want to deal with
 14 them. Obviously it'll have to be on a case-by-case
 15 basis but and depending on what the specific damage
 16 will be.
 17 Any other unfinished business? Any new
 18 business? All right. Any visitors? Hearing none,
 19 is there a motion to adjourn? Does anybody have
 20 anything for executive session? So we will adjourn.
 21 MS. MAHONEY: I will move to adjourn.
 22 MR. CUSHING: I second.

1 MR. GUSEL: Roll call, please?
 2 MS. RANK: Miss Mahoney?
 3 MS. MAHONEY: Aye.
 4 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?
 5 MR. CUSHING: Aye.
