PROCEEDINGS had before the Village of Downers  
Grove Board of Park Commissioners, taken at the Downers  
Grove City Hall, 801 Burlington Avenue, Downers Grove,  
Illinois.

PRESIDENT CUSHING: This will be the May 16, 2013  
meeting of the Downers Grove Park District Board. I  
would like to call the meeting to order. Roll call,  
please.

MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

PRESIDENT CUSHING: Here.

MS. RANK: Mr. Gelwicks? Ms. Mahoney?

COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Here.

MS. RANK: Mr. Roman? Ms. Souter?

COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Here.

PRESIDENT CUSHING: All please rise for the pledge  
of allegiance.

(The Pledge of Allegiance was  
said.)

PRESIDENT CUSHING: First item on the agenda is  
communications. Would any visitors like to address the  
Board at this time?

MR. DUYM: I would.

PRESIDENT CUSHING: Sir, step up to the  
microphone. Give your name and address, please.

MR. DUYM: My name is Peter Kenneth Duym. I live  
at 2640 Burlington in Downers.

The Park District, of course, owns the Belmont  
Golf Course. It has a retention pond there, and it has  
a discharge line. After the water gets so high, I  
believe it flows into this discharge line which empties  
into the creek that runs through my property.

We had that 7 inches of rain. I ended up with  
four inches of -- I mean 4 feet of water in my  
basement. I'm wondering, can the Park District change  
the set-up? Will they put a valve on it or a weir or  
whatever so that you could retain that water longer so  
it doesn't all come rushing down?

I mean, it went over at Burlington, stopped  
traffic on Burlington. So that's my -- wondering, if  
you can't respond now, you can respond next meeting.

PRESIDENT CUSHING: Okay. Thank you very much.  
Any other comments or any other visitors? All right.  
No more visitors. Anybody have written correspondence?  
Nothing, okay.

We have a special guest. We have the Executive  
Director of SEASPAR, Susan Friend, here tonight who  
will give us a presentation.

MS. FRIEND: Good evening, and thanks for the

1 opportunity to comment. We have an update on SEASPAR.  
2 First of all, congratulations to you, Matt, for the new  
3 position on the Board, and good to see you, Damienne,  
4 in a good role in the community, and look forward to  
5 working with you as the next years go by.

6 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Thank you very much.

7 MS. FRIEND: Since the last time I spoke with you,  
8 SEASPAR has been engaged in a strategic plan process  
9 that seems to span the calendar and the other calendar  
10 and maybe another calendar beyond that, and it's now  
11 time to finish, knot and cut bait, and we're starting  
12 to take action.

13 We did an extensive process that involved focus  
14 groups from the community and support groups with the  
15 Board and with other workers in the community working  
16 with people with disabilities, and we have a lot of  
17 good responses in that respect, and we also have a  
18 survey that was done by Leisure Vision, so we have a  
19 statistically valid sampling of the community, what  
20 people needed, what they liked, what they would like to  
21 see done differently in the future.

22 From that, we also re-established our mission

1 out monthly and gives you an update, but I would be  
2 happy to receive feedback. If you would like to share  
3 it, you would like to see something else or something  
4 new or different to add to it, I would be more than  
5 happy to take those into consideration and make some  
6 changes. Hopefully, this is a new and improved version  
7 of what you've been previously receiving.

8 As far as programs, last night we had one of our  
9 biggest events of the year, our Believe and Achieve  
10 Banquet, which we had almost 300 people for a sit-down  
11 dinner and a celebration of everything about SEASPAR.

12 We celebrated community partners who have  
13 supported SEASPAR, some for many years, maybe some for  
14 a short time, to do something really special that  
15 supports our programs and services and the people we  
16 serve.

17 We also recognize our athlete of the year, our  
18 cultural artist of the year, some achievement awards  
19 for individuals that aren't just in the SEASPAR  
20 programs but have become unique, wonderful people with  
21 special characteristics that we could all learn from.

22 So we would like to recognize those people, those

1 statement, but we created a mission statement that we  
2 felt had a little bit more of a stretch to it, to  
3 better describe what SEASPAR is and what SEASPAR does,  
4 and that would be to discover abilities, achieve  
5 potential, and realize dreams, because we feel that's a  
6 big part of what SEASPAR does.

7 We created core values, and we evaluated what we  
8 do and how we do it. We felt fun, excellent service,  
9 accountability, and respect were the core values that  
10 best explained what SEASPAR is and how they go about  
11 doing business every day.

12 So right now we're starting to work on new methods  
13 of growing, and also we've done a lot of growing in the  
14 the last several years, and I want to talk about that  
15 in a few minutes. But sometimes you have to catch up  
16 with your growth a little bit with internal processes  
17 to make sure everything is all nice and tight and  
18 working together. So we're working on those processes  
19 as well as more electronic marketing and a stronger,  
20 more effective workforce to plan for the future.

21 Hopefully you have had a chance to look at our  
22 news clips, our Commissioner's newsletter that comes

1 individuals, from our participation pool every year, as  
2 well, so in addition to recognizing volunteers and  
3 staff that have hit milestones with their time with us,  
4 and so it's a big celebration. So we're now coming  
5 down on the Believe and Achieve level today and putting  
6 everything away and getting ready for next year. It  
7 was a good time.

8 Special Olympics Sports has started to grow in  
9 many ways. Our winter sports program, which seems like  
10 a long time ago now that the 90 degree weather hit, but  
11 we've really started taking people farther north to do  
12 more practice and more intensive practicing to make  
13 them stronger individuals. When it comes to downhill  
14 skiing in particular, we're taking our snowshoers there  
15 next year as well as cross-country skiing, for a whole  
16 weekend of intensive winter sports training. So that's  
17 something that's really enhanced in that program.

18 We have our first ever power-lifter going to  
19 State. It's been a program that's taken some time to  
20 get going, but we found we have -- in fact, one of our  
21 residents who is going to be going downstate next month  
22 to power-lift for the first time representing us. So

1 we're excited about that.

2 Obviously, summer day camp is coming along, and  
3 we've made some changes this year. We've broken it up  
4 into being assigned to more bite sized pieces, so as  
5 families may need to change due to vacations or maybe  
6 summer school commitments, they don't have to choose  
7 between SEASPAR, day camp, summer school, and other  
8 family events, so we hopefully have greater options  
9 that makes it more attractive for people.

10 One of the unique things we've done in the last  
11 month was during the "paycut parks" down in Springfield  
12 a couple weeks ago, we had two participants go down and  
13 serve as pages for Senator Dillard and Representative  
14 Bellock, and that was a great experience for these  
15 individuals, as well as, it gave them a chance to get a  
16 behind the scenes look and help people get legislators  
17 informed of what SEASPAR was doing and how our member  
18 districts support us. It was a good time for all.

19 Another new thing that's happening -- I'm going to  
20 take a little of Jeff's thunder a little here, but  
21 we're looking forward to a new program with our SEASPAR  
22 Eagles, our adult day program. We're working with the

1 Parks Department on some projects, and we will be  
2 sharing information about that as we get it going. But  
3 he has already met with the group and started to get  
4 the group -- they're charged up and ready to go. It's  
5 going to be a great partnership and opportunity to work  
6 together.

7 A lot of our growth is tied to facility space  
8 availability, and in the last few months SEASPAR -- in  
9 the last year SEASPAR has been given some opportunities  
10 to consider for additional programming space. We're  
11 nice and tight over on Belmont. That's good. But  
12 programming space that we can take advantage of pretty  
13 much whenever we might need it so that we can do some  
14 programming.

15 Woodridge Park District is working on a potential  
16 building project, and so we're analyzing that, going  
17 through some costs associated with it. But it was an  
18 opportunity to meet and to look at, and going through  
19 the bushes and so forth, it turned out that a lot of  
20 the Park District had some space they could make  
21 available, about 2,000 square feet that we could lease  
22 free of charge for the next 15 years. So we decided

1 that was a good deal, and we're jumping on that.

2 So we're looking at getting that outfitted and  
3 starting to develop our program matrix to see what all  
4 we can do now that that's going to be available to us.  
5 Very likely, it will provide us another site for the  
6 Eagles program, and we're hoping to put in a sensory  
7 room for individuals with autism. So that will be a  
8 very special feature that no other special recreation  
9 association at this time has. So that's something we  
10 would like to bring along.

11 When it comes to dollars and cents, our member  
12 contributions, making it the total revenue portion of  
13 the SEASPAR budget, member contributions this past most  
14 recent completed fiscal year was 66 percent. Typical  
15 on average for special recreation associations around  
16 the Chicago area is about 71, 72 percent, and that's  
17 where we were a few years back. But we've been  
18 bringing that percentage -- the member districts' total  
19 revenue down each year, and projected budget for next  
20 year, it brings it down to 63 percent and a fraction.

21 So we're hoping to keep working with program  
22 revenues primarily and fund development to help bring

1 that level down even more whenever we can.

2 The aggregate member contributions over the past  
3 five years have been flat. Each district may have gone  
4 up a little or down a little based on the EABs of going  
5 up or going down Cook versus DuPage County, and they've  
6 teetered back and forth a couple times, but that total  
7 number has been pretty much flat for the last five  
8 years and projected for the next three. So we're  
9 trying to be good stewards of the taxpayers' money and  
10 deserving of the respect of managing people's money.

11 Downers Grove participation is still very similar  
12 to what the member contribution percentage is, pretty  
13 much balanced in that area, too. Over the last nine  
14 years, resident participation overall has gone  
15 51 percent, so we've had a lot of growth and a lot of  
16 boom in that area.

17 Fund development has gone well. Some of you may  
18 have been at the Tivoli Theater a few weeks ago when we  
19 had the American English concert, which was a sellout  
20 and a great time, and McDonald's Restaurant and  
21 Scarletti's offered a special at their restaurant that  
22 night, and we appreciate what they've done for us, as

1 well.

2 We have our summer kick-off party over at Ty  
3 Warner Park in Westmont on June 9th at 1:00. Free  
4 food, free fun. Come on out and enjoy it. We really  
5 appreciate your ongoing support, and we're excited to  
6 join working with a new team that you've put together  
7 here, and we see a lot of great opportunities in the  
8 future for new residents and look forward to whatever  
9 may come. So I would welcome any questions you have at  
10 this time.

11 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Questions or comments?

12 MR. McADAM: I would like to add, the Eagles  
13 program, the adult day camp, day care, what a great  
14 program it is. I know other districts have some of  
15 that, but the amount of time the staff puts into that,  
16 and some of the participants, I bumped into them in  
17 Springfield.

18 They came to one of the Board meetings, and they  
19 talked about what they're doing. Most people don't  
20 realize there's a lot of support services for those  
21 with disabilities when they're children, when they're  
22 young. Once they hit adult age, a lot of that really

1 corridor. If you have a map in your head, you can  
2 picture it.

3 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Some great things going on.  
4 We're proud to be part of it.

5 MS. FRIEND: Come out and enjoy.

6 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Thank you very much.

7 MS. FRIEND: You're welcome.

8 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Next item is the Consent  
9 Agenda.

10 MR. McADAM: This evening we have approval of  
11 minutes of April 23, 2013, regular and executive  
12 session minutes, the treasurer's report, payment of  
13 bills in the amount of \$918,322.75, Payout No. 2 for  
14 Hacienda Landscaping, Incorporated, for Gilbert Park  
15 Playground Renovation, Payout No. 11 and No. 36,  
16 Engineering Resource Associates for Lyman Woods  
17 Streambank Stabilization, Project Site Area No. 2  
18 and 3, Resolution 13-05 authorizing an exception to  
19 Park Ordinance 4.4.62 prohibiting the possession,  
20 drinking, selling, or transferring of intoxicating  
21 liquor in the park system.

22 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Could I have a motion.

1 falls to the wayside, and this is a place where SEASPAR  
2 is really stepping in and providing some of those  
3 support services that aren't there for them and their  
4 families, so I commend you guys. It's a great program.

5 MS. FRIEND: Thanks very much. It's been an  
6 exciting program to do. We always knew there was a  
7 need, but build it and they will come turned out to be  
8 an accurate expression in this particular case.

9 So we've had our -- our fifth anniversary is  
10 coming up in September, and we've been in Brookfield  
11 now for two full years and probably another year, year  
12 and a half. So it's still on the move, and we will be  
13 able to serve more age range now, too. So we're  
14 working pretty much with 18 to 35, a little bit beyond  
15 that, by having them divided by age a little bit more  
16 on that basis, as well. So we shall see.

17 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Now, how many communities  
18 are you currently serving?

19 MS. FRIEND: We serve 11. Population-wise, about  
20 75 percent is in DuPage County and 25 in Cook County.  
21 Roughly, Route 53 to First Avenue, the Eisenhower to  
22 the Stevenson, with the exception of the Route 83

1 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Real quick. Am I able to  
2 approve the minutes for April 23rd since I wasn't sworn  
3 in yet?

4 MR. McADAM: Yes. This is part of it.

5 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Okay.

6 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Anyone have any comments  
7 before we make the motion?

8 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I'll move to approve the  
9 consent agenda, including the payment of bills of  
10 \$918,322.75.

11 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Second.

12 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Roll call, please.

13 MS. RANK: Ms. Mahoney?

14 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Aye.

15 MS. RANK: Ms. Souter?

16 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Aye.

17 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

18 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Aye. Motion is passed.

19 We have four action items before you. I'm going  
20 to discuss 4.1 and 4.2 together, as they're the same  
21 item. Both of them are a direct result of the flooding  
22 we experienced specifically at the golf course, the

1 flooding, as mentioned earlier, by our guest.

2 We had a flooding of our course. Some of our golf  
3 course staff has experienced this before, and our pump  
4 room was under water for approximately a week, a little  
5 bit more than that. During that flooding, all of our  
6 electrical equipment and more importantly our  
7 controllers for our irrigation system for the golf  
8 course were fried out and inoperable.

9 So consulting with our legal counsel as far as the  
10 process in an emergency appropriation, we were able to  
11 find a one-year-old controller that was readily  
12 available for \$30,000. A new one would have been  
13 \$40,000. That required a \$15,000 deposit, which was in  
14 my purchasing authority, but what we would be  
15 requesting this evening on both of those action items  
16 is just affirming that purchase. The controllers are  
17 in and operating as of last Friday.

18 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Any questions, comments,  
19 concerns? So we need two motions.

20 MR. McADAM: Yes. We need to take them  
21 separately.

22 PRESIDENT CUSHING: So we need one motion at a

1 MS. RANK: Ms. Mahoney?

2 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Aye.

3 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

4 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Aye. Motion is approved.

5 MR. McADAM: I apologize. I failed to mention  
6 that we're in the process of making an insurance claim  
7 for that damage.

8 Our next action item this evening is Resolution  
9 13-04, authorizing withdrawal from the  
10 Intergovernmental Utilities Purchasing Cooperative.  
11 This is a cooperative that we have been in, and we've  
12 been exploring efficiencies in our purchasing for both  
13 electric and gas. We've determined that -- we're in  
14 this cooperative. This would be authorizing our  
15 withdrawal from that so we can go on to the market. If  
16 you have any additional questions, Jeff would be happy  
17 to answer those.

18 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Questions? It's laid out  
19 pretty well in the discussion by the attorneys. Could  
20 I have a motion.

21 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I'll move to approve the  
22 the Resolution No. 13-04 authorizing withdrawal from

1 time. Could we have a motion on 4.1 first, on the  
2 deposit.

3 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I'll move to approve the  
4 \$15,000 deposit for Vertical Variable Speed Pump  
5 Station Control Panel from Absolute Service, Inc.

6 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Second.

7 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Roll call, please.

8 MS. RANK: Ms. Mahoney?

9 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Aye.

10 MS. RANK: Ms. Souter?

11 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Aye.

12 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

13 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Aye. Motion is approved.  
14 Could we have a motion on Item 4.2?

15 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Yes. I move to approve the  
16 total purchase price of 30,000 for Vertical Variable  
17 Speed Pump Station Control Panel from Absolute Service,  
18 Inc.

19 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Second.

20 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Roll call, please.

21 MS. RANK: Ms. Souter?

22 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Aye.

1 Intergovernmental Utilities Purchasing Cooperative.

2 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Second.

3 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Roll call, please.

4 MS. RANK: Ms. Mahoney?

5 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Aye.

6 MS. RANK: Ms. Souter?

7 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Aye.

8 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?

9 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Aye. Motion is approved.

10 MR. McADAM: Our final item on the consent agenda  
11 this evening is Ordinance 1220 requesting authorization  
12 of declaring certain Park District personal property as  
13 surplus and authorizing sale or disposal.

14 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Discussion, questions? Jeff,  
15 are you out there? Could I have a motion.

16 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: I move to approve

17 Ordinance No. 1220 requesting authorization of  
18 declaring certain park district personal property as  
19 surplus and authorizing sale or disposal.

20 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Second.

21 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Roll call, please.

22 MS. RANK: Ms. Souter?

1 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Aye.  
 2 MS. RANK: Ms. Mahoney?  
 3 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Aye.  
 4 MS. RANK: Mr. Cushing?  
 5 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Aye. Motion is approved.  
 6 That's all the action items?  
 7 MR. McADAM: Correct.  
 8 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Agenda Board business,  
 9 President's report. The only thing I have is that Bill  
 10 and I attended a presentation by Ancel Glink last week  
 11 on current legislative legal items concerning the Park  
 12 District. It was pretty informative. It covered  
 13 personnel issues, FOIA training, alternative revenue  
 14 bonds, discussions on the tax levy. So I would be  
 15 happy to share anything with you, but it was a good  
 16 meeting and glad everyone was in attendance.  
 17 Other than that, that's all I have at this time.  
 18 Anyone else have comments? Okay. So we'll move onto  
 19 staff reports.  
 20 MR. McADAM: Thank you. Just a few things to  
 21 report this evening. This afternoon I had the honor to  
 22 attend the Park's ceremony that the Police Department

1 puts on, and this is the first year for attending that.  
 2 I was very impressed and very relieved. It really  
 3 strikes home with those folks around the street and  
 4 putting their lives on the line for us all the time.  
 5 It was a great opportunity for us to cooperate in the  
 6 park and be able to provide that and put on that event.  
 7 As a reminder, May 30th, 9:00, administrative  
 8 offices will be our strategic plan focus group and  
 9 planning session, which should be done by around 2:00  
 10 that day.  
 11 Father's Day was April 27th, and it was a great  
 12 success, and I have some pictures. We had a golf  
 13 outing and different ceremonies, and Pierce Downer used  
 14 much of our facilities, and it was an event that I  
 15 think they are looking to expand every year, so we will  
 16 be happy to assist them in that endeavor.  
 17 We just got this evening an update from the  
 18 Illinois Association of Park Districts on some  
 19 legislation that they have been advocating for in  
 20 Springfield. Specifically, Senate Bill 1637 has to do  
 21 with the outside program, which is one of the grant  
 22 programs administered by the Illinois Department of

1 Natural Resources.  
 2 The funding, sort of that is in the Real Estate  
 3 Transfer Act since it is transferring real estate.  
 4 Part of that money is being put aside to preserve and  
 5 develop open space.  
 6 That program from its inception has always been a  
 7 reimbursement program. So if you're awarded \$200,000,  
 8 \$400,000 for a program, we would need to front  
 9 development money or acquisition money on that and be  
 10 reimbursed afterwards, which in today's budget can be a  
 11 real strain on people to have that money.  
 12 Senate Bill 1637, which is now going to the  
 13 Governor's office, would front 50 percent of the Board  
 14 money in advance and then on a quarterly basis would  
 15 return the money to us on a reimbursement basis. So I  
 16 applaud IED for working with the legislature on doing  
 17 that. I think it will expand that program and make it  
 18 easier for both us and other agencies to take advantage  
 19 of it, knowing we don't have to front that kind of  
 20 money in advance to take advantage of that.  
 21 Finally, this will be a little bit of Paul's  
 22 thunder here, but Gilbert Park is coming along very

1 nicely. The equipment is in, and the climbing rock  
 2 looks really neat. It fits into the site really well.  
 3 The wood chips haven't gone in yet. They'll be working  
 4 on that. I'm sure he'll report on that, but  
 5 congratulations to him. He's done a really nice job of  
 6 putting the playground equipment down there.  
 7 To our staff that pulled out the footings, our  
 8 operations staff that did that work did a lot of the  
 9 prep work as well, and it's just been a real nice job.  
 10 Our old equipment is on its way to somewhere else in  
 11 the world for other kids to use, and I'm happy to  
 12 answer any questions you might have.  
 13 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I have one. Bill, could  
 14 you explain to the residents a little about the  
 15 ordinance we passed under the consent agenda for the  
 16 exception in the park?  
 17 MR. McADAM: Yeah. That's specifically for Fishel  
 18 Park concerts, not our first concert, which is with the  
 19 high schools that was appropriated there. Some of the  
 20 other contracts we're looking at, we're working with  
 21 Levitre Grocers as a partner, looking at this idea at  
 22 the very beginning in exchange for a sponsorship

1 package for them to be able to sell and provide beer  
2 and wine at that event while we stay at that site.

3 The ordinance essentially you passed tonight is  
4 for our Park District ordinance is allowing exception  
5 of that sale. We are still applying that we'll meet  
6 appropriate local and state liquor license to do that  
7 as well.

8 This is a first year trial basis to see how it  
9 goes. We'll evaluate that. If it's a success, we'll  
10 look to move forward. If not, then we won't repeat  
11 that.

12 We've had partner discussions in the beginning of  
13 idea, but I imagine there's probably others in the  
14 community that might be interested in that. It's a  
15 year-to-year basis, so we would evaluate that when the  
16 time comes, if someone else is interested in those kind  
17 of opportunities. We really want to start small this  
18 year, see how it goes. If it's not perceived well,  
19 then we can evaluate that. If it is received well, we  
20 can look into it even further.

21 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Thank you. Recreation report.

22 MS. RATHSACK: Good evening. From the monthly rec

1 report that you have, I will highlight some activities  
2 from the month of April as well as some upcoming events  
3 in May and early June.

4 The annual active adult center volunteer  
5 recognition luncheon was held on Tuesday, April 23rd,  
6 and 93 people were in attendance. 62 active adults  
7 also attended the two popcorn matinees, the movies,  
8 Life of Pi and Chasing Mavericks. 1,165 seniors  
9 participated in the active adult centers activities in  
10 the month of April.

11 At Lyman Woods 500 beehives were installed and  
12 used for the educational programs. Adult summer  
13 softball leagues are starting, and we're preparing to  
14 start basketball, volleyball, softball, as well as  
15 beach bum sand volleyball at McCollum Park.

16 At the rec center and Lincoln Center until  
17 May 19th, we are currently collecting used gym shoes  
18 for our annual gym shoe recycling program.

19 Upcoming events, this weekend, May 18th, Saturday,  
20 the kids flea market is going to be held at Fishel Park  
21 May 21st, which is next Tuesday, North and South high  
22 school jazz bands kick off that family concert series,

1 and that concert actually starts at 6:30, and all the  
2 rest will start at 7:00 p.m. going into the rest of the  
3 summer.

4 May 29th, National Health and Fitness Day, Older  
5 American month celebration will be held in the morning  
6 at the Active Adult Center.

7 To celebrate the 10th anniversary of Lyman Woods  
8 we will be hosting a 10-hour volunteer workday on June  
9 1st, so Chad is willing to take people who can work a  
10 few hours. If there's any people who want to do the  
11 whole ten, good luck to them.

12 Then we are currently taking registration for our  
13 Downers Grove five-miler which will take place on  
14 Sunday, June 23rd. With that, I can take your  
15 questions.

16 PRESIDENT CUSHING: People are looking forward to  
17 the concert starting, warm weather.

18 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: When are you going to  
19 announce the movies? When are the movie nights?

20 MS. RATHSACK: Brandi will answer that in  
21 the monthly report.

22 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Okay. I had the wrong

1 person.

2 MS. RATHSACK: I should know that, but I don't  
3 know if I've heard that.

4 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Okay. I'll wait.

5 MR. McADAM: I would like to highlight one thing,  
6 which is on the second-to-last page, Item C, which is  
7 miniature golf report. I really want to congratulate  
8 the staff and Justin and Sara and Jay.

9 We set out a challenge to increase attendance and  
10 awareness there. You can see from April to April,  
11 we're doing three, four times, you know, doing rounds  
12 and revenue and been very aggressive on advertising  
13 within the McCollum Park, very aggressive with coupons  
14 to attract people there and coming up with some food  
15 items. We're going to toss around some special events  
16 that center around miniature golf in those areas.  
17 We'll see if it keeps up. It's a really good start,  
18 and numbers that I've seen so far for May really  
19 continue that trend.

20 MS. RATHSACK: And thanks to Jay in the IT  
21 department. We now take credit cards and debit cards  
22 there, which were something we weren't able to do in

1 the past, so that helps out a lot for those that might  
2 just be in the park and don't have cash on hand.

3 MR. McADAM: If you get a hankering for a funnel  
4 cake, we got them there now.

5 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Thanks, Sara.

6 MS. BECKLEY: Good evening. For April and the  
7 first part of May, we're actually working on a change  
8 in our Activity Guide Production Schedule for 2013-14,  
9 and instead of a combined winter/spring guide, we will  
10 move to a combined spring/summer guide, which will be  
11 released in February.

12 This issue will also include the summer camps, so  
13 we will no longer produce a separate summer camp guide.  
14 We decided to change this based on feedback from  
15 residents who said they were waiting to register for  
16 summer programs or summer camps after the summer guide  
17 came out because they didn't want to overlap the camps  
18 in their programs.

19 That guide usually came out in April, so it was a  
20 period of time we were waiting for those to come out.

21 Our summer marketing intern will be starting with  
22 us on May 28th. Mitch Reeder just completed his junior

1 begin at dusk in Fishel Park. We have not chosen the  
2 films yet, as we are -- we have a list that we can  
3 choose from, but we want to make sure that we are not  
4 showing something that is also on the Tivoli's showing  
5 list for the summer, and particularly, Disney movies  
6 tend to be more expensive, and they have more  
7 restrictions on when they can be shown. So we are  
8 looking through the list of possible selections, and  
9 we'll get those up on our web page as soon as we choose  
10 those.

11 We are also calling for chili cook-off  
12 competitors, so if you or anyone you know has an award  
13 winning chili recipe, this is your chance for  
14 recognition.

15 The event takes place on Saturday, September 28th,  
16 and the winners receive cash prizes. First place gets  
17 a bid to the World Championship in Palm Springs,  
18 California, in October.

19 With that, I can answer any questions.

20 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: I have a question. You  
21 referenced a check-in special at the golf club. What  
22 is that?

1 year at the University of Illinois, majoring in  
2 advertising and minoring in informatics, which is a new  
3 field of study focusing on the combination of  
4 technology and communications. Mitch will be with us  
5 for 20 hours per week through August 2nd.

6 For the month of April, media coverage for the  
7 Park District totaled four advertisements, 39 articles  
8 and 10 photos, and we are working towards the milestone  
9 of reaching one thousand fans on our Facebook page.  
10 We're currently at 960 as of this morning, so we're  
11 almost there.

12 We also plan to implement a Twitter feed as of  
13 June 1st to increase our social media presence, and  
14 we're looking at implementing check-in specials at our  
15 golf club and our rec center through Yelp and Four  
16 Square.

17 As Sara mentioned, our first summer concert is at  
18 Fishel Park next week on Tuesday, and it does start at  
19 6:30. There is no concert on Tuesday, the 28th,  
20 because of the Memorial holiday, and then they will  
21 resume June 4th through August 13th at 7:00 p.m.

22 Movie dates. July 18th and August 15th. They

1 MS. BECKLEY: Different social media platforms  
2 offer a way that you, when someone is logged into that  
3 site, can see some sort of promotion.

4 If you are going to a certain place, like if  
5 you're going to the Downers Grove Golf Club, that  
6 person can pull up Facebook or Four Square or Yelp and  
7 log in as, "I am at the Downers Grove Golf Club."

8 If they do that, it gets basically sent out  
9 through their social network where they are, and then  
10 we will give them a reward for doing that. It's  
11 basically increased exposure for us, whether it's small  
12 bucket of balls or 10 percent off or something like  
13 that that we can offer. Thank you.

14 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Paul.

15 MR. FYLE: Good evening. Your planning report  
16 this evening. As Bill mentioned, at Gilbert Park, the  
17 playground equipment is in. The contractor completed  
18 the installation of the equipment, the assembly of the  
19 equipment in actually late April and then the last few  
20 weeks we've before working on the subgrade.

21 In addition to pulling some of the old concrete  
22 footings out of the ground, our staff also put in new



1 drain tile and drain stone base layer, and then our new  
2 mulch service actually went in today. So as of today  
3 we have our surface. We have the equipment ready, and  
4 we just need to -- our staff -- we do a safety audit of  
5 the playground equipment before we open it. So we will  
6 be doing that early next week and should have the  
7 playground opened by late next week.

8 Also, Barth Pond Dredge Project. On April 17th,  
9 the Park District published legal notice, and we posted  
10 on our website a request for qualifications for  
11 design/build services for dredging of the pond.

12 Legal notice was also posted on the Village's bid,  
13 bid notice page, web page. It seemed to have generated  
14 quite a bit of interest.

15 The statements of qualifications from dredging  
16 companies and teams of company engineers were due to us  
17 last Friday on May 10th, and I'm happy to report we did  
18 receive 15 submittals of teams for that work. So at  
19 this point the Village Staff and our staff will be  
20 reviewing all of those submittals and looking to narrow  
21 it down to hopefully around five or so of the most  
22 highly qualified teams that we believe are highly

1 not currently have a restroom on that floor.

2 We've been getting drawings from the architects,  
3 and actually I just received drawings today that are  
4 for permit submittal. We plan to turn those into the  
5 Village early next week so that we can begin that work  
6 in early June, and the goal there is to have all that  
7 work complete. Preschool starts in early September, so  
8 we will be anxious to get going on that in June and get  
9 that done this summer.

10 With that, I would be happy to answer any  
11 questions.

12 PRESIDENT CUSHING: The memorial lights, how much  
13 help are we going to end up getting from TGYB. I know  
14 we talked to them about, you know --

15 MR. FYLE: We have a couple of -- I would say two  
16 or three contractors that they've provided us,  
17 contractor information or names of a few contractors of  
18 for few different things that will be required. I  
19 think their goal is to be able to provide all of the  
20 contractor work. So there's a couple things we just  
21 need to nail down, which contractors will be doing  
22 which piece of that work. So we do need to get

1 qualified teams and requesting proposals from those few  
2 teams, including pricing for them.

3 Memorial Park Sports Lighting. At Memorial Park,  
4 we recently installed a few evergreen trees and some  
5 signage that was required as part of our County permit,  
6 and we're also look working closely with the forest  
7 preserve district to secure a temporary construction  
8 easement for use in the east parking lot when you go up  
9 a couple lights.

10 1846 Blodgett House, we did submit drawings to the  
11 Village in late March for structural improvements that  
12 is budgeted for the upcoming year, and I believe that  
13 the drawing review is complete at the Village, and I  
14 would anticipate going out to bid for that work  
15 possibly in June and awarding that in July and get  
16 started on that work this summer.

17 Finally, Lincoln Center renovations, we have  
18 engaged an architect to assist us with designing the  
19 layout of the improvements that are planned for the  
20 second floor of the Lincoln Center, so renovating four  
21 of the rooms there to become preschool rooms with sinks  
22 and also adding a restroom on the second floor. We do

1 together with them and work through that soon because  
2 we're hoping to get started end of July, early August,  
3 as soon as the baseball season is over. So I think  
4 we're anticipating all of the actual installation of  
5 the lighting to be done by their contractors. Thank  
6 you.

7 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Thanks, Paul. Geoff with the  
8 Parks report.

9 MR. PENMAN: Good evening. For the past 30 days,  
10 Staff has been really busy with the spring cleanup,  
11 getting things started again at miniature golf, park  
12 pavilion shelters, getting garbage cans out to the  
13 parks. Obviously, with the flooding, there was quite a  
14 bit of cleanup that went along with that, turned on all  
15 the drinking fountains and got water on in all the  
16 restrooms, so the units have been set up and the  
17 batteries replaced.

18 Athletic field work, Ed Turkis at Doerhoefer  
19 McCollum and Powers fields, which is at McCollum for  
20 adult softball laid out all the various soccer fields,  
21 installed the goals there.

22 We did add two additional geese -- they're Gander

1 Dispanders at Prince and Barth Pond, so those are in  
2 place now. We are going to continue to monitor those  
3 as to how successful they are. Those are to deter  
4 geese in those areas.

5 We'll be moving registration offices from the  
6 second floor to the lobby office -- or the main floor  
7 at the Lincoln Center and refinishing benches.

8 Basically, we treated 182 green, white, and blue  
9 ash trees to help prevent infestation of the Emerald  
10 Ash Borer. This is something I feel I talk about every  
11 time I'm up here. But it is an important part of it,  
12 and kudos to Mike, our forester, as he's been on top of  
13 this for the last couple years. He really worked at  
14 trying to make sure we can save as many of those as we  
15 can.

16 Also, Mike went out and tagged 35 native trees at  
17 a local nursery for planting this fall, so we've  
18 already identified the trees that we want for this  
19 coming fall and what we'll be putting in.

20 The Arbor Day program was held at Hummer Park on  
21 the 26th of April. First-graders from Whittier School  
22 attended, and there were two trees were planted, and

1 working with the Eagles program through SEASPAR to have  
2 them come out a couple times a week to help put wood  
3 chips around the trees, mulch the trees. So that's  
4 going to be a volunteer program, a chance for them to  
5 be able to come out and work with our staff on similar  
6 events, so we're very excited about that. We are  
7 expecting those to be at McCollum and Hummer Park. So  
8 that being said, I would entertain any questions.

9 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I have a question, but it  
10 probably would be for someone else.

11 MR. PENMAN: Probably.

12 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Jeff, normally at Fishel  
13 Park for the concerts in the park and now for the  
14 movies, are there usually recycling cans there? I know  
15 they're not there on a normal everyday basis, but I  
16 would think that would be --

17 MR. PENMAN: That would be a logical conclusion.

18 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Yeah. I don't remember  
19 seeing them but then --

20 MR. PENMAN: I don't know that they've been there  
21 in the past, but we'll make efforts to make sure we've  
22 got --

1 the classes named them Dominator and Woody, so I  
2 thought that was a nice touch.

3 Also, we worked on -- we will also be giving away  
4 tree seedlings as part of the Arbor Day program. We  
5 also were able to receive those for 13 other park  
6 districts to allow them to come here and pick them up  
7 and take them to their locations. Work at Lyman Woods  
8 has really focused a lot on flood damage. We tried to  
9 put the podium dock back in place, put barricades on  
10 the trails, things along those lines.

11 Horticulture areas. Obviously, spring cleanup in  
12 each of these flower beds. Annuals are on order and  
13 should be here actually next week at those locations.  
14 The annuals at Prince Pond are being replaced this year  
15 with perennials.

16 Golf course maintenance operations, as we talked,  
17 a lot of flood cleanup over there. We had to bring in  
18 pumps in order to bring the water levels down in those  
19 areas. They obviously lost the pump house. We're  
20 working on getting back out to do some more work on the  
21 greens there.

22 As Susan had mentioned, Staff is going to be

1 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Maybe one or two.

2 MR. PENMAN: Okay.

3 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Thank you. You were the  
4 right person.

5 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Everything is open and  
6 playable now at the golf course?

7 MR. PENMAN: Yes. And the irrigation pump is  
8 working well, so we're excited about that. It's much  
9 better than hand-watering for several weeks.

10 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Especially now with the warm  
11 weather.

12 MR. PENMAN: Indeed. Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Thanks.

14 PRESIDENT CUSHING: SEASPAR report. No further  
15 report. Susan covered it. Pretty good. Plan  
16 Commission. Nothing by the Plan Commission. Okay.  
17 We're onto unfinished business.

18 MR. McADAM: At the last Board meeting, there was  
19 a request to look at the location of the Freedom  
20 Memorial that is in Fishel Park.

21 Staff went back through our files to provide the  
22 Board certain facts on the history of the plaque and

1 then the eternal flame. In fact, there's a picture of  
2 the original dedication. It shows the plaque in front  
3 of the flame on a post, not on the ground, but on a  
4 post, on an angle. That was also provided to you, a  
5 photo of the existing condition of the Freedom Memorial  
6 at Fishel Park as well as various other locations in  
7 landscaping areas as well as parts of the pavilion  
8 itself.

9 As you recall, those who attended, residents who  
10 attended, were requesting that to be off the ground, to  
11 be put in more of a place of honor. Pat suggested and  
12 will continue suggesting some locations on the pavilion  
13 itself. That will be for consideration of the Board.  
14 We also want to provide you with some options and had  
15 us going back looking at the original mount, and that  
16 would be an option to the Board, as well.

17 PRESIDENT CUSHING: With that, where it was  
18 originally and where we have it now, I went out and  
19 looked it at this week, and I actually think where we  
20 have it right now is a pretty nice location.

21 I understand their concern, wanting to get it off  
22 the ground. I can definitely understand that.

1 honor. That would be my recommendation.

2 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I think if -- I believe it  
3 can come off the ground in light of, it was originally  
4 was off the ground, so we would be going back to how it  
5 originally appeared, so I think that's a good start.

6 Therefore, I don't think it can stay in the same  
7 spot because if we put it off the ground in the spot  
8 where it's now, it's just a tripping hazard. So you  
9 can't put it there. So that means if we put it off the  
10 ground, then we need to relocate it somewhere just  
11 aside. I would not prefer to put it on the pavilion  
12 wall, either. So I would think -- I went out there  
13 also and looked around. In the area where the sign for  
14 Fishel Park is, I'm assuming -- I didn't ask. I  
15 haven't asked, that right now there's tulips there. Is  
16 that a rotating planting bedding area?

17 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: So there will be seasonal  
19 plants or flowers there?

20 MR. McADAM: Correct.

21 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: On a regular basis.

22 MR. McADAM: The garden club actually rotates --

1 I have a concern -- I wouldn't support putting it  
2 on the building at this point because I think it's a  
3 slippery slope to go down. But I like the original  
4 placement, if you want to look at taking it off the  
5 ground, placing it on a pedestal, we can discuss that  
6 option, what you guys think about it.

7 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: My thought on it is, I think  
8 it should be taken up off the ground. And if you look  
9 at it from one direction, I could see why it makes  
10 sense to put it where it is now with the trees behind  
11 it. If you look in the other direction, it's actually  
12 closer to the sidewalk than it is to the trees. So I  
13 can see why it becomes easy for people to walk across  
14 it. In some people's perspective, it seems desecrated.  
15 So I'm in favor of getting it up off the ground,  
16 especially based on where it's at right now.

17 I also agree. We want to be careful of setting  
18 precedence by putting it on the wall of the bandshell.  
19 So I think a nice in-between would be in one of the  
20 planting beds. That way, it's not able to be walked  
21 across, and it will be up off the ground. We'll just  
22 have a nice go-between and still put it in a place of

1 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: So it rotates, okay.

2 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I think on the Curtis side  
3 of that Fishel Park sign would be a nice spot to put it  
4 because it identifies -- you're in the park. It says  
5 Veterans Memorial Pavilion, and if you have that on a  
6 pedestal there, it all sort of goes together. So I  
7 could see it going in that area, and I think that's  
8 very visible and a respected and respectful place for  
9 the plaque that we have. So I would be in favor of  
10 putting it off the ground, the plaque, and moving it  
11 to the Curtis side of the Fishel Park Monument site.

12 PRESIDENT CUSHING: It's a good spot.

13 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Yes.

14 PRESIDENT CUSHING: You walk right up on it there.

15 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Right. It's right by the  
16 big wide walkway there, and it will be constantly  
17 maintained because it is. So I think that's -- again,  
18 it goes back to how it originally was, which I think we  
19 would be honoring how -- the original intention in how  
20 it was going to be.

21 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Original design, original  
22 presentation.

1 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Right.  
 2 PRESIDENT CUSHING: I think it's a compromise  
 3 between -- they brought up at the last meeting that  
 4 where it's at right now, have full support lifting it  
 5 off the ground on a pedestal and over by the entrance,  
 6 by the sign, the entrance to the park.  
 7 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Thank you. Is this going  
 8 to be received in the spirit with which we're talking  
 9 about now or do you foresee --  
 10 MR. McADAM: I certainly can't speak for others,  
 11 but if it has concurrence with the Board, bringing  
 12 other ideas back to the Board, welcome to do that, but  
 13 we would convey that to respect the plaque, looking at  
 14 the original presentation of the plaque, that the  
 15 pavilion has the meaning of that. This is a way to  
 16 compromise, to show off that plaque without setting  
 17 precedence of putting plaques there.  
 18 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Concurrence with --  
 19 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I concur.  
 20 MR. McADAM: We'll communicate back conditional,  
 21 and start making plans to make that change.  
 22 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Excellent. Anybody else with

1 unfinished business? No. All right. So anybody with  
 2 new business? No.  
 3 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I'm assuming we'll get back  
 4 to the gentleman who came tonight?  
 5 MR. McADAM: Yes, we will. We will have to look  
 6 into the situation and all the engineering that goes to  
 7 that, but we'll communicate back.  
 8 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: I'm not sure what it is out  
 9 there, but if we lost power, there's not much we can do  
 10 after that. I mean --  
 11 MR. McADAM: He is correct. Crossing the road.  
 12 Numerous places, retention areas --  
 13 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Only one that's -- a truly  
 14 unfortunate event.  
 15 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Hopefully it will not occur  
 16 again.  
 17 PRESIDENT CUSHING: I will be long gone.  
 18 No other new business. So we have an opportunity  
 19 for visitors to address the Board. I don't see anybody  
 20 out there. So we will go on to executive session.  
 21 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: I motion to adjourn to  
 22 executive session as written on the agenda.

1 COMMISSIONER MAHONEY: Second.  
 2 PRESIDENT CUSHING: Roll call, please.  
 3 MS. RANK: Ms. Souter?  
 4 COMMISSIONER SOUTER: Aye.  
 5 MS. RANK: Ms. Mahoney?
